tes on some of the birds of the 12th Saint John Christmas Bird Count, 1968

Recorded for the first time were Bohemian Waxwing and Water Pipit.
The pipit is apparently the first winter record for New Brunswick.
Palmer and Tufts each give one December record for Maine and Nova Scotia, respectively. Records of New England Birds lists usually three to six records each December for Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut.

Barrow's Goldeneye, Red-tailed Hawk, Myrtle Warbler, and Savannah Sparrow 2 Longwere each recorded for the second time, and Yellow-breasted Chat was recorded for the second time during the count period.

Pine Grosbeak (95, against previous high of 63), Common Redpoll (246 vs. 41), and Song Sparrow (18 vs. 13) were recorded in substantially greater numbers than previously. Evening Grosbeaks (105) were substantially higher then all previous counts, except 1964 (185).

A number of fairly regular species were not seen this year. Buffleheads were missed for only the second time in the last nine years due to the freezing over of Marble Cove, their known feeding area. Brown Creeper was not seen for the third time in the 12 years and Golden-crowned Kinglet was missed for the very first time. It was the fourth count with no Snow Buntings, even though the Saints' Rest marsh was fairly well covered.

Variety-wise the 1968 count with 5% species ranks equal with 1961, following after 1967(59), 1966 (55), and 1965 (54).

They said that they approached it quite closely and had an excellent view.
