Saint John, N.B.

Dec. 27; 7:30 a.m. to 5:15 p.m. Clear; -5° to + 1°C; wind NE to NW 15-40 Km/h; Ground bare; rivers partly open, lakes frozen. 30 participants (13 in 7 field parties, 17 at 15 bird feeders). Total party-hours, 36 (21 on foot, 15 by car); total party-km, 465 (20 on foot, 445 by car).
