## The Saint John New Brunswick (NBSJ) Christmas Bird Count December 19, 2021 67<sup>th</sup> Year (1945, 1946 and 1957 to present)

Right to the punch line: More than 10,000 birds from 84 species were seen within a 24-kilometre diameter circle during Saint John's two darkest weeks of the year. It took 63 people to find them, but I'm still amazed.

All this despite the reports from many observers that there weren't many birds. "Where are all the Hairy Woodpeckers, Blue Jays, nuthatches and finches?".

Numbers of some species were well down and there were no siskins, no crossbills, no Red-bellied Woodpeckers which have been showing up the last few years, only four Pine Grosbeaks and no Snow Buntings. And yet, 500 Snow Buntings were reported from the Springfield area only 35 km away.



Once again there were no Boreal Chickadees, but it was the best year for Canada Jays that I can recall. Eight of them from two different areas and probably 3-4 more that chose to show up in another area only on the day before and the day after the count. Of course!

With 20+ species of warblers being found around here in the summer, it's always interesting to see if any linger to the Christmas count. If any warblers are "usual" in winter, they would be the Yellow-rumped and Pine and both of those were present during the count and count week respectively.

As far as sheer numbers of birds go, we sometimes get to 15,000 individuals, but Richard Blacquiere and his team at the landfill site will tell you that's been achieved on days when the landfill equipment is working and turning stuff over creating lots of delicious food for the gulls and those associated with them. Even in a non-operating state like this year, the landfill yielded 800 gulls, 43 Common Ravens, 639 American Crows, 45 Bald Eagles and almost 1800 European Starlings – overall, one-third of the birds seen within the count circle.



Some of the unusual species this year include Blue-winged Teal, 10 Barrow's Goldeneye, 2 American Coot that had been at Rockwood Park for the last several weeks and several predator species — American Kestrel, Snowy Owl, Short-eared Owl and a Northern Shrike within the city. My wife and I were glad to find a Hermit Thrush thinking it might be the only one for the count; turn turns out there were four in town for the holidays.

The most unusual species this year is not even a recognized species in New Brunswick yet – a Slaty-backed Gull that was observed for a couple of days at the landfill site starting on December 30. Almost as large as a Great Black-backed, this species normally winters from southern Japan to Hong Kong, but occasionally shows up in the northern parts of North America. It will likely be accepted as a new species by the Bird Records Committee, retroactive to the date that it was first observed, so it is included on the list here.

We had several new participants this year – Cynthia, Patricia, Gordon, Evan, Penny, Chrissy, Derrick and Ryan. Hopefully they found it a rewarding experience and will be back for more.

Thanks to everyone for participating. There is no date set for the 2022 count yet but the weather is forecast to be almost perfect. And, if the landfill fans get their way, it will be on a day when the dump is open.
